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good working years left in them. However, the suggestion is a good one.

In order to institute term limits within the club, the By-Laws must be changed. In reviewing the By-Laws, I find that the section governing change to the By-Laws is section 7.10. This section reads:

7.10 These By-Laws may be amended by a majority vote of the total club membership, or by a two-thirds vote of members present at any meeting if advance notice of the proposed amendment(s) has been published for all members to read in the club newsletter. Proposals for amendments shall be submitted in writing and shall be read word for word by the Secretary just prior to voting.

At the January meeting, I will bring up the suggestion of term limits made at the November meeting. If there is sufficient interest in pursuing a change in the By-Laws to institute term limits, a proposal to change the By-Laws will be drawn up and published in the April Squelch Tales. To help insure that everyone has a voice in this matter, a voting ballot will be published in the next newsletter (if a proposal is made), and each member will have the opportunity to vote on the measure and return their ballot for counting and consideration. As section 7.10 notes, it takes 51% of the total membership, or 66% of the members attending a regular monthly meeting to change the By-Laws. If we get enough response from the ballot, then the matter will be decided. However, if response to the ballot is light, then the matter will be voted on by the membership attending the April meeting.

For those of you who are getting on to the Internet these days, I will be publishing a sample list of "hot" Internet addresses that I have accumulated over these past few months. In the

last newsletter I noted that I had finally taken the plunge and gotten on to the net. Well, I think I may have taken a deep plunge into a shallow point and hit my head. "Why", you ask? The NASA address is also interesting in that you can use it to browse other NASA sites and get pictures, files, or general information about space. The AT&T "You Will" server is the first attempt by this major corporation to put multi-media on-line. In fact, with the right hardware and software, you are supposed to be able to run short "infomercials" like the "You Will" commercials we see on TV. Of course, most of the Colleges and Universities are on-line, and the Auburn address will let you "visit" that university not too far away.

Next issue I'll visit the "B's" to see what's of interest. Who knows what I'll run across in the next three months. If you are in doubt, DON'T DO IT! On at least one occasion, possible commercial traffic was heard being conducted on one of the NFARL repeaters.

- Please identify with your complete call sign. And remember, you must ID at least every 10 minutes, and at the end of the conversation before you sign off.

- Though nothing will be said to possible offenders on-the-air, they will receive telephone calls explaining what they did wrong and asking them not to do it again.

Vern Fowler is the "OO" coordinator for Georgia. He is in charge of 27 OO's in the state. (See the associated article elsewhere in this newsletter. - ed) Vern will send out a postcard as a reminder to the first time offender. After 4 violations, a pink slip will go out to the operator. In My Opinion...

There are many ways to volunteer in this hobby. Volunteerism is a keystone to Amateur Radio, so when people volunteer, they are only fulfilling one of the unspoken requests that being a "Ham" places on them. The government doesn't make it a requirement, and no one will ever force you to do something extra. But still, Amateurs from Novice to Amateur Extra feel the need to give back something that was "given" to them.

Why people volunteer is personal. How they volunteer is as varied as there are people in this hobby. Some people work public service events, donating countless hours to help with auto traffic, crowd "control", "health-and-welfare" communications, coordination of event volunteers and managers, and any other activities deemed necessary by event organizers. Hams show up at "oh-dark-hundred" to help setup and get organized. They work long, hard hours in blistering heat, numbing cold, rain, and sleet. Long after participants and spectators have gone home, Amateurs are still on-site putting equipment away, and getting ready for the next event on the calendar.

For these hams, volunteerism is putting in the long hours of hard work in a very public sense. However, there are many hams out there who may not expend as much physical energy, but whose dedication to the hobby is as strong as any other volunteer. These are the hams who either give of their time to be Volunteer Examiners (VE's) or what is known as Official Observers (OO's). These are the hams I would like to take a closer look at now.

What makes an Amateur want to become a Volunteer Examiner. A person at a

club meeting once asked me if I was a VE. When I told him I was, he asked how it felt to be sitting up at the front of the room giving the tests, rather than taking them. You know, I really hadn't thought much about it until then.

I remember when I first started taking tests for my licenses. (Oh no! Not "I remember when again" speech? I promise to keep this short.) Until the mid-1980's, all tests (except for Novice) were given by FCC personnel, either at their offices, a prearranged site, or at hamfests. A lot has changed since the VEC's took over this testing. It's a lot friendlier atmosphere now than back then. Not because the FCC people weren't friendly, but when you process that many people on a regular basis, you tend to forget the individual groups who come your way. So, the Amateur Service applicants got processed just like the commercial service applicants did.

So, how do I feel when I participate in a VE session? Well, I won't pretend to speak for other VE's, but I feel that the time I give in each testing session I work is my way of giving something back to the people I meet, and my hobby. I feel that I contribute as much back to my hobby as anyone else who volunteers their time. I am proud of the effort I have made to get my certification, and participate in some small way to the giving of tests. Michelle and I used to work long hours helping at events. I personally believe that being a VE is as rewarding to me as anything I have previously done. And, it gives me an opportunity to help the group I feel I owe a lot to, the Atlanta Amateur community.

The other group I mentioned at the beginning of this editorial was the Official Observers. This group is often misunderstood in their activity and intent, and many times looked upon with suspicion.

Amateur Radio has always been one aspect of the radio service that has prided itself on taking care of itself with minimal help from the government. Back in the mid-70's, during the big CB

boom, the FCC had its hands full trying to keep up with CB people out-of-band, running illegal power, working DX, using improper ID's, etc. It was a radio service almost, if not totally, out-of-control. People fought, literally, with other service users over who had the right to talk on a channel. Most of the time this involved one person jamming another person. Sometimes, rarely, it came down to physical assault. The good thing to come from all this was a large influx of people, tired of the "CB mess" who made the switch to Amateur Radio. Michelle and I were a part of that crowd who came over in the mid-1970's.

The tradition of looking out for ourselves has grown over the years. Now there is a service that encourages volunteer operators to monitor the ham bands, not to "enforce", but rather to help hams who might be unknowingly breaking a rule or regulation.

The intent here is that it is far better for the Amateur, and the Amateur Radio Service, if an operator learns of a mistake from another ham in a caring, friendly way, rather than having to get something in the mail that can literally ruin his or her day.

Each month, each volunteer Official Observer, or OO, fills out a report for their state coordinator showing how many hours they volunteered to this effort. It is not unusual for an OO to spend well over 50 hours per month monitoring the bands. These people are not monitoring because they have a desire to be policemen, or policewomen, but because they want to help each of us. That's all. And again, each of these volunteers feels as good about the job they do as the VE, or the person working a public service event.

What does it take to be a VE or an OO? Basically a license, and a desire to help other hams. As a VE, holding an Amateur Extra license is a big help, because an Extra can give a test to anyone, while a General and Advanced can only give tests to someone applying

for a license up to one level below the level of license they currently hold. For the ARRL, becoming a VE also means taking a test to become certified.

Becoming an OO is much like becoming a VE. You need a license, passing a certification test, and a desire to help your fellow hams.

Who can become a VE or OO? For a VE, you need at least a General Class license. Generals can give tests to Technician and Novice applicants. Advance Class licensees can give tests to Novices, Technicians, and General applicants. And, as I noted earlier, Extras can give tests to everyone. Having three Extras around for a test session makes life a lot easier for the coordinator of the session. Rules clearly state that each session MUST have at least 3 qualified examiners present. If these 3 examiners are not present, then the results of the session will not be accepted by the FCC, and no tests will be given. Each participating examiner must sign a form giving our names and calls certifying that we participated in the session and adhered to the rules governing VEC sessions.

To become an OO, there is a set procedure that a potential OO goes through to become a part of what is known as "The Amateur Auxiliary to the FCC's Field Operations Bureau", or just "The Amateur Auxiliary". A recommendation is made by the OO coordinator for the state to the ARRL Section Manager (SM). All OO appointments are initiated by the Section Manager or the SM's designee, the OO coordinator. The SM then sends an appointment card to ARRL HQ indicating a recommendation. The prospective OO then is sent a training guide, other material, and an examination. The candidate then takes the open-book test and sends the exam back to the ARRL for grading. The candidate is then notified if he/she has successfully completed the exam. If the candidate failed to pass certain areas, a retest is given. Once the training is

complete, the SM is notified, and the new OO is sent an appointment certificate. The training guide for The Auxiliary Service is over 60 pages long, and is very comprehensive. There are specific procedures that the OO candidate must study and understand on how to deal with potential problems that may be caused by fellow hams. In all cases, cooperation and help is stressed, and if necessary, the notification of proper OO officials. The objective here is to help each other, and continually prove to the Federal Government that we are more than capable of helping ourselves with as little government intervention as is possible.

In fact, the stated general objectives and concepts of The Auxiliary Service are to:

1. foster a wider knowledge of, and better compliance with, the laws, rules and regulations of the Amateur Radio Service,
2. extend the concept of self-regulation,
3. enhance the opportunity for individual amateurs to contribute to the public welfare, and
4. enable the FCC to efficiently and effectively utilize its manpower and resources.

In all, both services are working well, and continually need new people joining to help them provide better service to the people they help every day.

If you are interested in either being a VE or OO, you can contact the ARRL. The ARRL is the coordinating organization for the OO service. However, the ARRL is only one of several coordinating VEC's in the U.S. The ARRL can either direct you to a local ARRL coordinator to help answer your questions, or can provide you with information on other VEC's operating in your area.

Either way, in my opinion, being a VE or OO is a great way to volunteer your time, and give directly back to a service that has given all of us a lot in return.

So whether you decide to work a parade or bike race, coordinate a regatta or hamfest security, volunteer your time to Sci-Trek or participate in club events like Field Day, or decide to go a step further and become a VE or OO, you are still contributing, still giving back. More importantly, helping to maintain the quality of the service that is the history of Amateur Radio over the past 80+ years.

To all of the volunteers out there, no matter what you volunteer for, I salute you for your commitment, dedication, time, and effort.

With the beginning of each new year comes a new challenge. The challenge is to come up with a set of program topics that people will enjoy each month.

Some programs are already set because they are annual events. In May we have our annual auction. By-the-way, now is the perfect time to start saving things for the annual auction. The better the equipment, the more interesting the event.

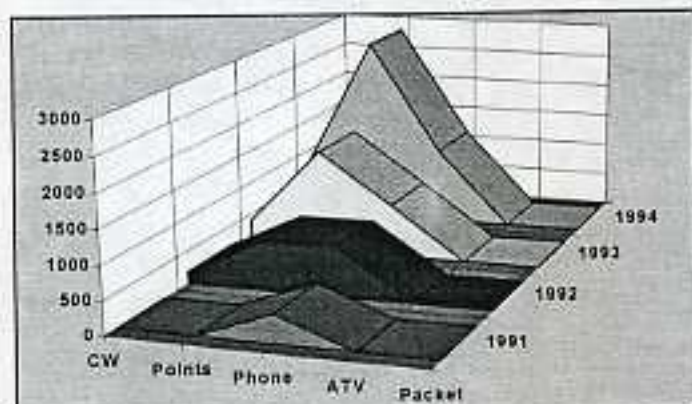

November is election night, and a Q&A session with the officers. It's a great time to get your club related questions answered.

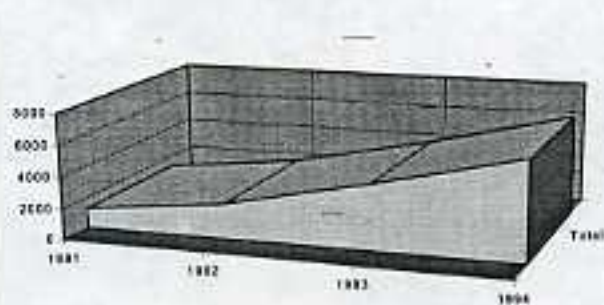
December is the Christmas party. The rest of the year is open. Remember this is your club, so let the officers know what you want to see as a program.

Field Day Results 1991 - 1994

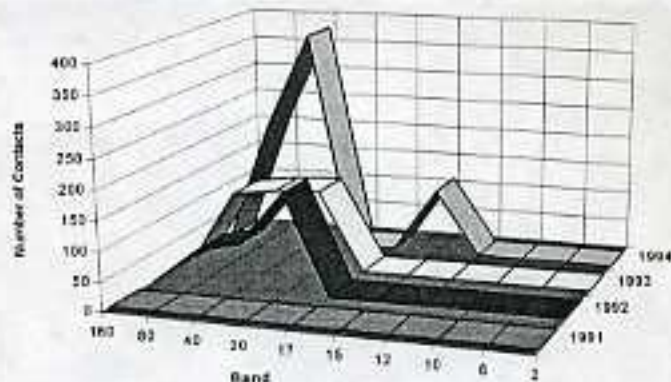
Field Day Recap



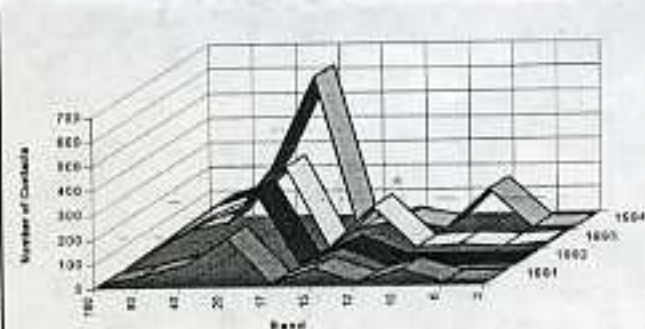
Total Points



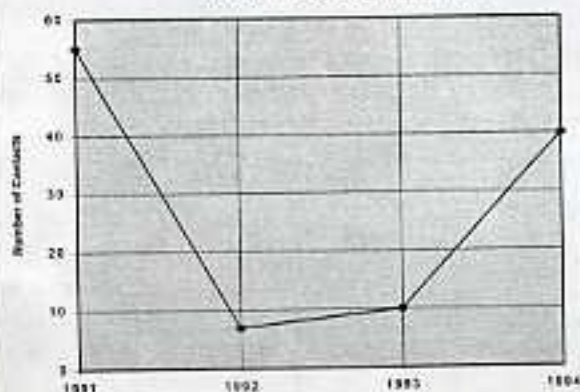
CW by Band

Upcoming Programs

January 11 - Vern Fowler, W8BLA to talk about Ham Radio '95, and Daniel Ortiz, AD4FB to give us a lesson in basic electricity.
