

Program Update

Neil Foster, N4FN, and **Ian Kahn, KM4IK**, will present our May program on the latest version of [Ham Radio Deluxe](#) (HRD), an integrated suite of software products for amateur radio. The five components in the suite provide rig control, logging, digital communications, satellite tracking, and rotator control. Neil and Ian have been involved in the development and testing of the latest version, HRD 6.0.

HRD has been around since 2003 and was developed by **Peter Halpin, PH1PH (SK)**, and **Simon Brown, HB9DRV**. By late 2005, the number of registered users stood at 20,006. In 2011, HRD was sold to **Rick Ruhl, W4PC**, **Randy Gawtry, KØCBH**, and **Mike Carper, WA9PIE**.





The program will include a live demonstration of how HRD 6.0 works. So, whether you are unfamiliar with HRD or if you are using an earlier version, you should find something of interest in this presentation. Join us at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 21, as our NFARL insiders take us “under the hood” for a close-up look at this intriguing and useful collection of ham radio software.

Equally important are the Shack Sloths, who accumulate points by working the guys and gals on the summits. Christian stressed the importance to the program of those who work those on the summits so even if you can't get out, these folks really appreciate your contacts. We all thank Christian for an entertaining introduction to yet another way to “play radio.”

May brings two annual events to the amateur radio community. For those with even a passing interest in QRP there is [Four Days in May \(FDIM\)](#), an event run in conjunction with the Dayton Hamvention. FDIM is a real opportunity to meet the movers and shakers who make things happen in the world of QRP. If you have never been to FDIM, I highly recommend it. Good conversations, QRP vendors, interesting talks, FDIM has it all. Sessions are timed such that FDIM does not compete with Hamvention. This is one time you can truly have your cake and eat it too!

The other event is, of course, [Hamvention](#), held in Dayton, Ohio, or simply “Dayton.” Last year 25,000 amateur radio operators from around the world attended. Each year there is a theme and this year it is DX. Casual operator or Honor Roll member, we all enjoy working a “new one” and this year's Dayton, as always, should have something for everyone. If this is your first go 'round, don't hesitate to reach out to NFARL members who are “old hands” at Dayton for advice and maybe a guided tour of the boneyard. And, please don't forget the traditional “bring your own sack lunch in the stands behind the HRO booth” on Saturday.

I would be remiss not to put in a comment or two on [Field Day](#). This annual ARRL event is always the fourth full weekend in June and we are planning a full-boat effort again this year. In addition to

the usual CW and HF phone stations, we are planning to really go after 6 meters this year. We want to expand our digital efforts. The satellite gang will be there. And we will again feature our Get On The Air Station (GOTA). If you were licensed after June of last year or have been inactive for the past two years, GOTA is just for you. Our Fine Adventure in the GQP / Wes Lamboley, W3WL



You won't regret it. I know I never will.

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
Browsing the Library / Keith Plossl, K4KRX

All hams use antennas and there are lots of subdivisions today with antenna restrictions. Stealth antennas and hard-to-see wire antennas hung in trees may help significantly.

The ARRL Antenna Compendium Volume 3 is now in the NFARL library. This book does not address antenna covenants, but it does address lots of antenna types, including:

- verticals, ground planes and slopers;
- miniature, trap and multiband dipoles;
- yagis;
- loop antennas;
- and the list goes on.

I prefer difficult-to-see wire antennas hung in trees. Trees hide wires and provide natural tower equivalents to get the wires high in the air while only looking like trees. Even in the winter, trees have branches that camouflage wires hung in them.



This book may describe how to build an antenna that you might want to try. Look this book over and check out the book if you see something that is interesting. There just might be an antenna that is just right for your location. Library materials are available at each NFARL monthly meeting.
